Enrich lives in Borneo

Have you ever been interested in caring for orangutans? Seeing them in real life? Or even in the wild?

We have an amazing opportunity for you. You can visit our rehabilitation centre in Borneo and help orangutans. Your days will be varied, ranging from trips to the local market for vegetables to an afternoon with the resident botanist collecting approved berries and fruit for the orangutans.

During your stay, you will work closely with the enrichment staff to develop new enrichment items for the orangutans: using vegetables, recycled items, forest materials and seeds.

It's hands-on and hard work but very satisfying. A highlight each day is to watch the keepers distribute the new enrichment items and observe how the orangutans interact with them.

We are running four 14-night programs from November 2017 to February 2018. SPOTS ARE LIMITED.

Not just a new house, a new home

In February, we reported on the new year's first rescue mission, to save an infant female orangutan in Pilang village, Central Kalimantan. Who could forget Baby Jacqui. She was brought to Nyaru Menteng underweight, injured and sadly orphaned.

After eight months of rehabilitation in our Orangutan Reintroduction centre at Nyaru Menteng, Jacqui is now a very healthy one-and-a-half-year-old baby, weighing 5.9 kg. She is very independent and loves to climb trees and build nests from leaves and twigs. In the Nursery Group, Jacqui is very close to another orphaned baby Bumi; whenever Bumi gets scared, Jacqui is always there to comfort him and give him a hug like a doting big sister.

Moving day

In August, Jacqui and 15 other baby orangutans, including Mema, Zahri and Kalanis, moved into their new Baby House. The new Baby House is equipped with an indoor playground and enrichment facilities as well as a special Forest School located less than 100 metres away designed for the Nursery Group orangutans.

BOS Foundation is committed to rehabilitating these babies, familiarising them with the wild environment, and releasing them into the forest once they are old enough. But even before they start to learn basic life skills in the Forest School, they must first be free of trauma,



and our new baby house is specially designed so we can provide them with the best possible care. With the help of our dedicated team of babysitters, we aim to give them comfort and security to help build their confidence.

It's not just a new house, it's a home. We hope the baby orangutans are happy here and will grow up healthy, so that we can later return them to the forest.

It was with your support that these babies now have a safe home where they can learn and thrive. We couldn't have done this without your help. Thank you for helping our babies learn and grow on their journey to freedom!

A tiny arrival at Nyaru Menteng on 14 February 2015 marked the beginning of a very special relationship with a very special little orangutan.

Valentino, named because of his arrival date, has been melting hearts ever since. He arrived at Nyaru Menteng in very poor condition. He was about 5 months old and weighed a tiny 2.2 kg. There were wounds all over his fragile little body.

With round the clock care and attention from our dedicated vet team and babysitters, little Valentino has survived his horrific start to life and is now a thriving, healthy and happy one-and-a-half-year-old.

He is currently attending Nursery Group where he is learning survival skills such as nest building and climbing. We hope to see him graduate from here to Forest School.

Kicking goals for #OrangutanFreedom

As part of our ongoing commitment to orangutan survival, we aim to reintroduce 100 orangutans to their natural habitat in 2017. We're pleased to report we've reached our halfway goal of 50 freed orangutans.

Your ongoing support has enabled these latest releases.

12 freed in Central Kalimantan

In August, four male and eight female orangutans, accompanied by a release team, made the nearly 12-hour road and river trip from our centre in Nyaru Menteng to the Bukit Baka Bukit Raya National Park (BBBRNP), where they were released at predetermined locations.

7 freed in East Kalimantan

In July, three male and four female orangutans made the 20-hour journey from Samboja Lestari and were reintroduced to the southern part of the Kehje Sewen Forest in East Kutai Regency. All are ready to live in the wild after completing a lengthy rehabilitation process through Forest School and pre-release stages.
